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CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

and merits the attention of parents, teachers, administrators, and guidance-counselors. Much is being said and written nowadays about the conservation of our natural resources and man-power development. The Filipinos are telented, creative, and intelligent. This is especially true with the growing generation. Are not these human resources not to be considered richer and more valuable than the natural resources? Unfortunately, much of human energy is wasted through non-use or misuse. Waste of ability is a "loss to society".

Young people whose scholestic performance lags far behind their intellectual ability represent a serious loss to society in terms of their potential contributions. Serious educational maladjustment is often due to the delay in discovering early enough the discrepancy between achievement and ability of the students. Many capable students do not realise that they possess outstanding ability and consequently do not have the ambition to utilize their capacity. Parents and teachers have a great responsibility in helping the underschievers to realize their potentialities and to bring out their maximum capacities.

The problem of underschievement should be a matter of great concern to those who are engaged in the field of aducation since underschievement prevents the individual from fully realising his potentials. If an effective solution to this problem is found, both the underschieving individual and society will mutually benefit. In order to be able to solve the problem, one has to identify the cause of it. Hany studies have been made, both in the Philippines and abroad, about the relationships of some non-intellective factors to the students achievement. Hany researchers have found out that study habits and attitudes, personality, and self-concept are positively related to academic achievement. Despite the considerable research devoted to this topic, there has been little advance in isolating the real causes of underschievement.

The focus of this study is on the underschievers. In order to pursue the research to some depths, attention has been directed toward a limited number of cases. Through these case studies the researcher tried to identify the probable causes of underschievement.

Statement of the Problem

Through analyses of many measures and data about each Case, the researcher sized to discover the following:

- 6. Their study habits and attitudes, and the specific problems in the SSHA that are common to the majority of underachievers.

More specifically, the following research hypotheses were tested:

Hypothesis 1. There are negative personality characteristics that are common to the majority of underachievers.

Hypothesis 2-8. There are problems identified by the use of the Mooney Problem Check List, that are common to the majority of underschievers.

Hypothesis 2-b. The area "home and family" is a serious problem area for the majority of underachievers.

Hypothesis 1. The majority of underschievers are not "well-accepted" by their peers.

Bypothesis 4. The majority of underachievers does not have adequate self-concept.

Hypothesis 5. The majority of underachievers does not have high academic motivation.

hypothesis 6. The majority of underschievers does not have good study habits and attitudes. There are problems in these areas that are common to the majority of underschievers.

The Importance of the Study

The findings of this study will give teachers, guidance-counselors, and edministrators new perspectives on underschievement, since by probing deeply and intensively into the problems of the fifteen underschievers, the researcher hoped to gain better insight into the problems of underschievement. Although many previous studies done on this topic have been surveyed; in-depth studies have been rare.

It is also hoped that procedures for the proper diagnosis of the problems of underachievers will be formulated for use by classroom teachers. The researcher further hopes to formulate recommendations which will be useful for teachers and administrators in assisting underachievers make full use of their abilities.
