## Abstract

This study analyzed and compared the novel The Fault In Our Stars by John Green in (2012) and its film version in (2014). The similarities and differences of both versions were identified based on their plot, characters, setting, theme, point of view, and symbolism. The Symbolism Approach was used to discuss the depth and meaning of the story while the Deconstruction Theory was used as bases to explain the minimal alterations made in the film version.
