ABSTRACT

Visual Arts in the Philippines can be described as fusion of western and native cultural influences. It reflects the wide range of cultural influences on society, and how these influences honed the country's arts naturally shows. Influences of the Spaniards along with the impact of other countries can still be seen in the works of these skilled Filipinos as caused by colonization since the beginning. With the renewal of nationalism in the latter decades of the twentieth century, indigenous forms and motifs have also been adopted by modern visual arts.

Filipino artists, such as Fernando Amorsolo, Napoleon Abueva, Vicente Manansala, Juan Luna, and many more have contributed for putting visual arts on the map and leaving a legacy that continues to inspire generations of artists. Up to now, they are still known and considered as national artists of the Philippines.
